

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

STUDENT SPOTLIGHT: Bibianna & Tindi Mashamba

Our students are often recognized for their ability to advocate for their own education, but not all of them have immediate access to the financial resources required for tuition. The following article introduces two of these students. It is from the generosity of our community that we are able to offer scholarships to students like the Mashamba sisters. Their story, including their request for college prep education, has been shared by news agencies around the globe.



Bibianna and Tindi Mashsamba, two members of our current junior class, are a long way from their home country of Tanzania. As vibrant and creative Coyotes, they remind us every day to be resilient and grateful as well as encourage us to be active global citizens and to work daily to make the planet a better place.

The sisters were born in Kasitamu, a small fishing and farming village about 10 minutes from Lake Victoria in Tanzania. Their father owned a farm and grew corn, sweet potatoes, beans, and cassava as well as raised goats and chickens. The girls grew up with their three older brothers, Mayala, Simon, and Tabe, their older sister Siku, and younger sister Shihajibu. Their mother died shortly after Tindi was born, and the girls remember their father as well as their older siblings working hard on the farm and fishing in the lake to support the family. They have fond memories of their village; they swam in the lake, played tag with their brothers, and made clay dolls and sewed them clothes. They attended the local primary school, where the teachers were very strict and spanked them if they didn't finish their homework. They always finished their homework!

Bibianna and Tindi were born albino. In Tanzania, there is a superstition that if one takes an albino's limb to a witchcraft doctor, one becomes wealthy, and if one uses the limb for fishing or mining, one will be more successful in those pursuits. When Bibianna was 9 years old, her father told her about this superstition, and she started having nightmares. He told the girls not to talk to strangers and to run if someone follows them. Shortly after this revelation, their father got sick and died. The girls went to live at their aunt's house. Three days after their father's funeral, three men broke into the house at about 11 pm. While Tindi hid in the corner of the room under a blanket, the men drugged Bibianna in her sleep and cut off her right leg and two fingers. Bibianna and the girls' cousin, who also was asleep in the room, woke up and started screaming. The girls' aunt and uncle came running into the room, and the three men escaped.

The sisters immediately went to the local hospital, where they stayed for 11 months,



Bibianna receiving medical treatment and both girls finding safety. During this time, a journalist came to the hospital to interview them, and Al-Shymaa, an albino woman who had just been elected to the Tanzanian parliament, read the article. She contacted the girls' aunt, came to visit them in the hospital, and offered to be their legal guardian. She was the first other albino whom the girls ever had seen. She offered to watch over them and find a boarding school where they could be safe and learn. First, the girls attended St. Mary's Primary School in Mwanza, a relatively large city in Tanzania, for one year, and then they switched to Kongowa Adventist Primary School in Dar-essalem, an even bigger city. Eventually, Al-Shymaa found them another school, St. Anne Marie, also in Dar-essalem, where there was a community of albino students supported by a nonprofit called "Under the Same Sun." They stayed at this school for three years. The girls remember loving the city life, and it was during this time that they began becoming interested in the arts as well as activism.

While the girls were students at St. Anne

Marie, a research student from USC who was studying albinism contacted Al-Shymaa and requested an interview with the girls. By this point, many journalists had talked to the sisters, and Al Shymaa had seen them come and go without helping the girls. She told a journalist, that Bibianna needed a better prosthetic leg. The journalist, who had found out about them through a friend named Malena in Los Angeles, organized with Malena the girls' trip to Pasadena to get Bibianna a new leg. After the interview with the journalist, off they went to California!

The girls spent three months in Pasadena, Bibianna going to doctors' appointments and both girls being homeschooled. Malena asked the girls what they wanted before they returned to Africa. Tindi talked to Bibianna, and they decided that what they really wanted was to stay in California to attend school - a big request! She felt that they would receive a better education as well as being safer. Malena agreed to her request and also became their legal guardian. She started looking for boarding schools and soon found the Montessori School in Ojai, where they



attended for a year while living with a local host family.

When it came time for high school, Tindi picked Besant Hill. The sisters came to visit and saw Senior Hill, as well as Leland doing a Biology experiment outside with a group of students. She fell in love with the campus and thought to herself, "This is where I want to be." Bibianna remembers that school was hard at the beginning, and it took her about a month to adjust, especially to all the hillsnot easy with a prosthetic leg! Soon, however, it became tranguil and peaceful for her - the classes, food, surroundings. She appreciates the "supportive, open community." Tindi loves Besant because it's so easy to approach and talk to people. "I feel that I can make as many friends as I used to make in my country."

Both girls are artists and actively pursue their creative passions at Besant. They write poetry and have been published in several anthologies. Bibianna loves to dance and act; who can forget her starring role as "Medea" in 9th grade?! She was also in "Once Upon a Mattress" and "Almost Maine." She has great comedic timing! In addition, she co-wrote an autobiography with a French journalist ("Je Ne Suis Pas un Talisman" - I am not a Talisman). Tindi is a painter, actress, writer, singer, and songwriter who is constantly creating and expressing herself through these mediums. Both girls fully take advantage of our artsbased curriculum and clearly live our motto, "Aún Aprendo," every day.

Bibianna would like to attend college in New York City because she loves big cities and also wants to take advantage of the accessible public transportation system there. She plans to study forensics and law. She loves watching forensic files. "In my country from my experience forensic people are not doing enough to solve murders and are not putting full efforts into matters that are happening. So many weird and stupid things happen, and the police are just taking notes and not solving crime." She would like to remedy this situation by becoming an advocate better criminal investigation.

Tindi likes to educate people. "I want to become a public speaker and singer. I believe that with my voice I can make the world a better place for people with albinism. I can speak against the killings and the hunting that are happening to people with albinism." She is optimistic about change. While she realizes that sad things happen, she knows that one can't change the past and can only move forward.

"Every morning I wake up in bed, and I always know that I am the voice. I want people to notice that I am albino, and I am the voice of people with albinism. People with albinism are just people like everyone else. The only things we need are sunscreen, sunglasses, and long sleeve shirts and pants to protect ourselves from the sun. The issue with albinism is a real issue, and everyone worldwide needs to pay attention to the issues that are happening to people with albinism because albinos have the right to be free from fear or to be free from being hunted or killed for our body parts."

The Mashamba sisters, true global citizens and activists, pursue their dreams every day and sincerely want to make the world a better place. They inspire us to get out of our comfort zones, let go of our self-centered concerns, and get up and do something, embodying Goethe's suggestion: "Knowing is not enough; we must apply. Willing is not enough; we must do." The sisters are applying themselves and challenge us all to do the same every day, along with them. •

COLLEGE UPDATE

The Class of 2020 has been busy this fall, engaging in rigorous academic programs, devoting extra time to college searches and admissions petitions, remaining actively engaged outside the classroom, and serving as stalwart leaders of our student body. No small task, but our seniors successfully passed the first hurdle by meeting the recent application deadlines for the UC and CSU campuses. A number have also filed applications to colleges offering ED, EA and Early Rolling admission plans, and favorable returns already have begun to trickle in. While the lion's share of application deadlines fall on January 1 or beyond, I'm pleased to report our 12th Graders effectively have been managing their time and dutifully executing their college-related responsibilities with much aplomb!

The recent months have seen a record number of college representatives visiting campus to promote their schools and engage with our students. A highlight of these exchanges was the recent Linden University Fair when all of our students had the chance to converse with admissions directors from 24 higher educational institutions from around the globe. Over the fall term, Besant hosted admissions deans from 78 different colleges and universities, representing 28 different states and 6 foreign countries. While more visits are in store for this spring, for now, autumn travel season has finished as college admissions offices turn to evaluate applicant files.

On the professional development and school representation front, yours truly participated in several opportunities this fall. Among them, I attended the National Association for College Admissions Counseling Annual Conference in Louisville, Kentucky, offering both excellent programming and infinite networking opportunity 8,000 college admissions counseling with professionals in attendance. I also participated in an invitation-only Counselor Fly-In hosted by the University of Utah in Salt Lake City.

With respect to standardized testing, Besant Hill administered the PSAT to every 10th and 11th Grader in mid-October, and hosted the October 5 and November 2 national SAT Program administrations. Besant Hill will also serve as an official SAT Program test center for the May 2, 2020 administration.

Looking ahead, while seniors file their remaining applications, I look forward to engaging the juniors in a series of bi-weekly seminars introducing them to curricula I've devised covering all aspects of the college process. These sessions will initiate each 11th Grader's college quest in earnest. The incoming returns for the Class of 2020 will continue to be carefully monitored as each moves toward confirming final college plans by May 1, 2020, the National Reply Date.

In closing, I consider it an honor to work closely with Besant Hill students and families, and likewise my Coyote faculty and staff colleagues, who play a vital role as supportive advocates and compelling recommenders of our charges. I look forward to helping all of our students grow through the process of self-reflection and personal discovery in their journey to identify and secure admission to one (if not several) undergraduate matches where they will likely flourish. It just doesn't get any better than that! •

Sustainability Updates

The overarching goal of the Besant Hill Sustainability program is to create a culture of awareness and appreciation of the natural world, to educate the members of our community on ways to live their lives in an ecologically sensitive manner, and also to be inspired to take a proactive approach to environmental issues facing our world. Following is an update on a few of this year's sustainability activities and initiatives.

Ojai Valley Green Schools Coalition

Besant Hill School is one of the founding members of the Ojai Valley Green Schools Coalition (GSC). The student-led group is composed of seven member schools throughout the Ojai Valley. Tony J. '20, Milo H.-M. '20, and Harkrishan K. '20 are this year's representatives at GSC meetings.

"Did You Know?" Initiative

The Besant Hill Sustainability Committee, which is composed of 12 students, teachers, and administrators, has initiated the "Did You Know?' video series. The committee presents short, interesting, and informative environmental-themed videos that are played during school assemblies.

The Circle Garden

For almost two decades, students and staff at Besant Hill have enjoyed the wonderful feeling that comes from working in The



Circle Garden. Starting this past fall, with the help and enthusiasm from the Botany class and numerous student volunteers, The Circle Garden has been undergoing a transformation and update that includes removing old fencing, building new raised beds, new compost bins, drip irrigation, birdhouses, garden art, signs, greenhouse repair, and the planting of additional fruit trees. Ojai Creek Cleanup

In October, the Ojai Valley Green Schools Coalition, in conjunction with the Ojai Green Coalition, and the California Coastal Commission, organized and took part in a creek cleanup in downtown Ojai. Twenty Besant Hill students participated in the event!

Phasing Out Single-Use Plastic Water Bottles

Following the lead of several universities, by the year's end, Besant Hill Students have agreed to phase out our use of single-use plastic bottles. In addition to pollution created during production and transportation, plastic bottles are the third most common item found in ocean debris, and though they are recyclable, many never are. Plastic water bottles break down into increasingly smaller pieces, but never really go away. As a result, microplastics have become a major issue in marine environments. *




COMMUNITY SERVICE

The Community Service aspect of life at Besant Hill School is one that gives students the opportunity to partner with local organizations to make a direct, immediate, and meaningful impact in their community. Though it is a requirement for students to participate in at least two community service events per semester, many of our students sign up for several of the events that are offered.

INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY HIGHLIGHT

Each August I look forward with great anticipation for the Yearly Database to be shared with me. This internal document holds the names and contact information of all of our incoming students. For a teacher, it's the first glimpse of our new community members, and through the columns of basic information, a delicate framework of our classes begins to take shape. I'm always wowed each year at the number of students who come from abroad. I usually read the list from the perspective of a mother and a teacher. The mom in me empathizes with the family decision to send a child to a faraway place requiring a maelstrom of trust in the universe that this investment and community will provide a safe and nurturing space for their teen. The teacher in me brims with excitement as I read the list of countries from where our students hail, which will provide glimpses of worlds mostly unknown to the rest of our community. This





year, I also read the list from the perspective of a Global Citizen.

We guide students at Besant Hill School toward understanding Global Citizenship, that it's a responsibility and that everyone is one. There is no "othering" or "opting out" of Global Citizenship. And as a community, we are constantly defining and redefining what that means. Responsibility is a range, a spectrum, and given the current tender political, financial, and atmospheric times, it's tricky to articulate and consider roles.

So as I was reading the long index of countries- Canada, China, Czech Republic, Italy, Japan, Kuwait, Martinique, Mexico, Saudi Arabia, South Korea, Taiwan, Tanzania, Thailand, Ukraine, United Kingdom, United States, and Vietnam- I asked myself, what does healthy cultural integration in such polarizing times look like? How as educators and mentors do we create the safest environment for each perspective to be valued, included, and belong?

The answer began to take shape during our annual Faculty Institute at the end of August and will continue throughout the year. The Humanities Department is working collaboratively on initiatives that involve offering diverse perspectives in literature and history classes. We're bringing in professionals from around the world to work with students and staff to better understand the balance of assimilation and cultural identity our students from abroad experience. We're planning an array of auxiliary programs and weekend offerings to expose students to cultural arts and activities. Students are experiencing a cultural integration simulation during Class Connections that provides a sensory experience detailing what it's like to feel like a stranger in a strange land. We're examining the language we use with each other and improving our understanding of stereotype bias. We're talking about white privilege.

In just the first few months getting to know our new students from abroad and reconnecting with returning students, it's clear that the initial delicate framework of the early class lists are becoming more refined and lively. Our students are unique and as interesting as ever. It's going to be quite a year! •

BIONEERS



In late October, 11 BHS students accompanied by Shannon Rowan and myself, attended the 30th annual Bioneers conference in San Rafael, California. This trip marked the 15th consecutive year Besant Hill students and teachers have attended the conference. With well over 3,000 attendees and 30 years of visionary leadership, Bioneers is the premier conference for today's climate and cultural visionaries. Besant Hill students were able to experience keynote addresses from awardwinning authors Bill McKibben, Eve Ensler, Terry Tempest Williams, and Paul Hawken, as well as several other extraordinary activists.

At the conference, Besant Hill students were members of a 500+ student youth leadership alliance. The alliance was created to bring together students of varying backgrounds, who are dedicated to social and environmental justice, scientific research, and discovering ways to create a more just and equitable society and natural environment through education and action. The youth leadership program provided opportunities for our students to participate in forums and panels with a diverse group of their peers.

We were particularly excited to hear Bill McKibben since every student is reading one of his books during Class Connections. Since Bioneers is a relatively intimate gathering, we knew it would be possible to meet McKibben and glean some insight and inspiration from the acclaimed author. What started as a simple email, informing him of our reading project and attendance at Bioneers, quickly culminated in a text message at the conference from Mr. Mckibben himself, inviting BHS to meet privately with him after his keynote address. Mr. McKibben sat down

> with us for 30 minutes and discussed our school, the books we are reading, and he provided guidance on what we can do to effect change.

Mckibben has written over a dozen books on climate change and is the founder of 350.org. Foreign Policy named him to their inaugural list of the world's 100 most important global thinkers, and the Boston Globe said he was "probably America's most important environmentalist."

Students found inspiration in the many workshops they attended throughout the weekend. Risa G. '21 recalled the message of speaker Gerry Tello: "When you go to a new place you have the knowledge of your ancestors as well as the ancestors of the land you are on. So you are never alone, you

VISITING MUSICIAN

On September 22, The Besant Hill Community was very fortunate to have pianist Tomer Gewirtzman, a virtuoso pianist who had just performed as part of the Concert on the Mountain concert series, come to play and answer questions from our community at a special assembly. Born in Israel, Tomer started his musical education at the age of 8, with Ms. Raaya Shpol at the Rubin Conservatory in Haifa. From 2008 to 2011, he served in the Israeli Defense Forces, in the "Outstanding Musician" program, where he combined regular military service, with extensive music studies at the University. After completing his bachelor's degree at the Buchmann-Mehta school of music in Tel-Aviv, he earned his Master's degree and Artist Diploma at the Juilliard School, where he received the prestigious Kovner Fellowship award.

Tomer began his presentation by giving some biographical information about himself and his music education. He continued by sharing some background information about the musical elements of the piece from which he was to play several excerpts. Tomer to focus his presentation on Carnaval, Opus 9 by Robert Schuman. Schuman is one of the most highly regarded composers of the Romantic period and was known to write both programmatic and absolute music. Carnival is an excellent example of Romantic programmatic music, as there are musical characters throughout the piece that Schuman named and developed throughout the composition. Tomer chose a

thorough explanation of each character and then perform the piece for the audience. This approach to performing the piece gave lots of musical and critical insight into the musical genius of Robert Schumann. Throughout the Masterclass, Tomer took numerous questions from students and faculty ranging from his favorite pieces to perform to his philosophies on practicing. It was really inspiring to hear some of the profound questions that students asked him during the masterclass.

The Special Assembly was a wonderful opportunity for the Besant Hill Community to see and interact with a world-class musician. Due to the size of the theater and the arrangement of the seats in the Zalk Theater, there was not a bad seat in the house. One of my favorite fun facts about the event was when Tomer was asked what he likes to do to relax. His reply was that he was fascinated with math and that he loved to do math problems for fun which brought great laughter and cheers from the Math Department. Not only did Tomer spend the morning sharing music with our community, but he also stayed for lunch and continued the dialog about music and math for nearly another hour with students.

Everyone was really grateful for Tomer Gewirtzman's time and talents, and we all greatly look forward to the next Masterclass/ Special assembly featuring Chamber on the Mountain performers.

Additionally, I am working for an incredible professor, Dr. Carolyn Merchant, who has been a pillar of the ecofeminist movement, helping her to publish a never released edition of Hugo Iltis' book The Life of Mendel, exploring gene theory and debunking myths surrounding race and genetics that were prominent in Nazi Germany.

I also have been an active member of the

Berkeley Student Food Collective since my time at Berkeley, where I have served on the board for two years as the Director of Policy (2018-2019) and the Director of Membership (2017-2018), continuing to use many of the leadership skills I learned at Besant during my time on Student Government while also fighting for food justice and sovereignty in the Bay Area!

Also remaining dear to my heart after leaving Besant is the knowledge that a strong community fosters strong individuals who act with individual responsibility and collective accountability. That being said, I have found a strong community in the Berkeley Student Cooperative, a housing cooperative where I have lived with 123 other students, cooking together, cleaning together, and gathering weekly for all house councils for the last year and a half.

Much of what I learned during my time at Besant Hill has remained with me, and I look forward to visiting soon! •

TRAVIS CHAN '16


Is currently in his senior year of college. He is still planning to pursue a medical career and hopes to get into medical school after college. He misses the community and that feeling and warmth of home.




2018-19 ANNUAL REPORT
